# Instructional Approach and Methods

#### **ATTENDANCE:**

This is a performance-based class. Attendance is mandatory. Theatre is a collaborative art, and to learn to perform you must be here and participate. Much of the process of learning about acting involves interacting with your peers in class. Show a positive attitude and take an active role in all activities.

## INSTRUCTIONAL APPROACH AND METHODS

The focus of this course is an exploration of the voice through physical and mental preparation. Therefore, the student will perform the techniques and exercises to the best of

their ability as part of the requirements for this course.

Much class time will be devoted to preparation and evaluative activities. Other activities will include observation, research and exercises which will support the goals of the class objectives. Class discussion based upon the classroom exercises and well as assignments outside of class and student participation will be expected because the course is a performance based subject.

Students will be evaluated upon their degree of participation and attendance.

Students will also be graded on several performance scenes. Students will not be graded on whether their performance is good or bad, but upon the degree of preparedness and the final evaluation of the instructor.

You will also be expected to keep a journal of reflections on each class meeting. These will be turned in periodically, so they should be brought to every class meeting.

Also included is education of acting techniques of 5 legendary acting coaches.

In this class, it is also important to understand the connection that theatre has with film. Over the course of the semester, 6 films will be watched and discussed to help understand this connection.

## **AUDITION REQUIREMENT**

All students will be required to audition for the fall production of *Of Mice and Men*, regardless of whether you intend to take part in the production. Audition experience is invaluable to your actor training. Auditions will consist of a 1-2 minute prepared dramatic monologue and cold readings from the script.

### **CLOTHING**

Movement or gym clothes are required. You should wear comfortable clothing that you will be able to move freely in; nothing too tight, and shoes good for movement (no slides, flip-flops or sandals; tennis shoes recommended). Not wearing the proper clothing will not excuse you from the exercises, but the inability to do the exercises will lower your grade.

# **Assignments**

- Assigned readings from text, plays, and *Of Mice and Men*
- Class discussions, exercises, improvisation, theatre games and activities; which will help you build self-confidence as you find new ways to express yourself. In-class participation is **mandatory** to pass this course!
- Papers:

**Monologue Papers (4):** You will write 2 page papers based on the 4 monologue performances, analyzing voice and movment.

**Of Mice and Men Paper:** You will write a 2 page analysis/criticism paper of this play.

**Improv Paper:** You will select an element of the improv technique and write a short paper analyzing that form.

**Film with Theatre Paper:** You will write a short paper connecting theatre with film, with a focus on voice and movement.

## -Performance Projects:

**Monologues:** You will select, memorize and prepare 1-2 minute monologues from plays of your choice. You will perform in front of the class, receive direction/critique, revise and return for a final graded performance to the class, while experimenting with different vocal and physical techniques.

**Final Scene:** After being assigned partners, you will select, memorize, block & rehearse a 4-6 minute scene from a play of your choice. You will perform in front of the class, receive direction/critique, revise and return for a final graded performance to the class, while experimenting with different vocal and physical techniques.

- Read the play *Of Mice and Men* and demonstrate analytical skills with reading, writing and discussion
- View Fall Walters State Production, *Of Mice and Men* and write a short critique of the shows (Guidelines provided) <u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: Failure to see this <u>required production</u> will result in a <u>penalty of 100 points!</u>

\*\*Late assignments are not likely to be accepted. If exception is made, it will be by prior consent and at the instructor's discretion.

# **Class Participation**

This is a participation-based and individualized growth-oriented class. While learning about theatre and film, you will also learn basic information about performing, which is a a form of everyday communication. A class in vocal and physical preparation can benefit other aspects of your life, both personally and professionally. You will be evaluated on the process and effort as well as the final product. This class is a supportive, cooperative environment where we learn by doing and learn from each other. Don't compare yourself with others.

Wear comfortable clothing suitable for movement and floor work. If you are dressed inappropriately, you will not be able to take part in class and it will affect your participation grade.

**All papers at least 1 full page**. Papers less that one full page will lose points.

Plays written for theater often contain strong language: profanities, violence, sexual terms or religious references. However, this class forbids work that promotes hate. <u>Choose your scenes carefully.</u>

The nature of acting and any acting course or performance includes <u>physical</u> contact from time to time with fellow students/actors. On occasion I may also have to adjust parts of your body for proper alignment and to release tension. However, you will never be touched if you don't want to be. Please see me privately if you are uncomfortable and need to discuss these issues.

When attending theatre performances and class arrive on time, be attentive, quiet and respectful; especially during performances!
