Student Learning Outcomes/Objectives

- Student will develop and show progress in technical, musical, and performing skills through standard repertoire appropriate to their level of study. This will include but is not limited to:
 - 1. Awareness of the physical mechanics required for appropriate keyboard playing including posture, shoulder, arm, and hand position
 - 2. Piano technique gained by level appropriate scales, arpeggios, cadences, and other exercises that demonstrate technical proficiency
 - 3. Improvement in musicianship through level appropriate sight-reading, memorization, and collaborative experiences
 - 4. Performance and practice skills, including memorization and expansion of repertoire and literature
- Student will learn and perform three pieces per semester, two of which will be memorized.
- Appropriate knowledge about each piece (composer, date, form, significant facts about composer, time period, or piece) and written and verbal communication of this knowledge will be required.

FRESHMEN: Only verbal communication of this knowledge is required

SOPHOMORES: Written communication in the form of program notes will be required for all repertoire performed during the school year.

Testing procedures will be performance based in lessons, repertoire classes, recitals, and the juried final.

Assignments

Lessons: Each lesson will be graded on the student's preparedness and improvement. At the end of each lesson the student will receive a weekly practice sheet with the upcoming week's assignment (practice techniques, exercises, literature, etc.) and a space to record the practice time fulfilled each day. Students are **required to bring either a small spiral bound notebook, a three-prong folder, or binder** for the keeping and organizing of lesson materials and practice records and assessments.

Practice: Student's registered for 1 credit hour (30 minute lesson) must practice a minimum of three (3) hours each week. Those registered for 2 credits are required to practice at least six (6) hours each week. Students are to write down the exact practice times each day on their weekly practice sheet, in order to accomplish a more accurate lesson assessment. Failure to keep accurate logs may result in a grade reduction.

Rep Class/Studio Class: Twice a semester music majors meet to perform repertoire for their peers. While attendance is required for both, **performing is only required for one**. **It is *highly*

<u>recommended that the student perform for both</u> to gain skill at mastering performing technique, nerves, and giving and receiving constructive comments.**

Literature: Students registered for 1 credit hour will be assigned a minimum total of 3 songs for the semester, one of which must be memorized. Those registered for 2 credits will be assigned 3 songs minimum, two of which must be memorized. All music must be brought to your lesson each week. Failure to bring the appropriate and assigned materials may result in a grade reduction and cancelled lesson.

Midterm Juries: Midterm juries serve as the midterm exam for this individual instruction course. Like the "pre-jury" the midterm jury allows the student to perform as they would in the actual jury. **Requirements for midterm juries:** perform approximately half of the semester's literature from memory during normal lesson time.

Juries: Juries serve as the final exam for individual instruction courses. The student will be called in front of the music faculty to perform selections from the semester's repertory. To prepare for juries, the final lesson of the semester will be a "pre-jury" lesson where the student will perform all assigned pieces for the instructor from memory as they would in the actual jury.

Class Participation

Class participation and preparedness is essential.

Course and Class Policies/Procedures

Lessons may be rescheduled under the following conditions and **only** under the following conditions:

- 1. The student has a **documentable** (doctor's note, etc) emergency.
- 2. The instructor has to cancel.
- 3. Campus is closed due to inclement weather. If the campus is still open, lessons will occur and documentable proof of ineligibility to drive must be given should the student miss their lesson.

FACEBOOK IS NOT AN ACCEPTABLE MEANS OF COMMUNICATION. Upon presentation of documentation of an excused absence (doctor's note, school function on W.S. letterhead, informing the instructor of illness before the lesson, etc.) the instructor and the student will schedule a make-up lesson the same week of the missed lesson. If the absence is unexcused, or if the student is a "no show" there will be no make-up lesson scheduled and the student will receive a zero for the lesson (resulting in approximately a ½ letter grade deduction from the final grade). We have a limited number of lessons--please make every effort to attend every lesson throughout the semester.

Repertoire (Rep) class will occur twice throughout the semester. Rep class is an opportunity for you to perform in front of your peers. Please come prepared to rep class with your song memorized with correct pronunciation of your title and composer's name. Failure to appear and perform at rep class provides the same consequence as missing your lesson.

Academic Honesty

COURSE GROUND RULES

- Students must attend the first day of on-ground class or contact the instructor prior to the first class. Failure to do this may result in being dropped from the class. Excessive absences may substantially lower the course grade.
