Catalog Course Description: A pre-calculus course in the theory and application of polynomial, logarithmic, exponential, rational, power and inverse functions. This course is designed for people majoring in technical fields and to prepare students to take MATH 1910 - Calculus I. Students should consult with their advisor to decide among MATH 1530, MATH 1630 and MATH 1710. Prerequisite(s): ACT Math score of 22 or higher (or equivalent score as determined by the college placement and assessment procedure) or completion of mathematics learning support requirements. Corerequisite(s): MATH 0030 required for students with ACT math score below (or equivalent score as determined by the college placement and assessment procedure) or have not completed all learning support mathematics requirements and MATH 1030; or permission of Dean of Mathematics. Student Learning Outcomes/Objectives

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of functions by several means (verbally, numerically, graphically and symbolically).
 - 2. Use linear, quadratic, polynomial, rational, exponential, logarithmic functions, and inverse functions to solve problems and judge the reasonableness of the results. 3. Analyze data, develop representative mathematical models (including regression analysis), and evaluate the appropriateness of the model.
 - 4. Use appropriate technology to solve mathematical problems.
 - 5. Build sum, difference, product, quotient, and composite functions.
 - 6. Use transformations to change a graphical model by varying constants and coefficients in a function.
 - 7. Demonstrate an understanding of the concept of imaginary numbers and do basic operations with complex numbers.

- 8. Apply the Fundamental Theorem of Algebra to find all complex zeros of a polynomial.
- 9. Solve logarithmic and exponential equations.
- 10. Find horizontal and vertical asymptotes of rational functions and sketch the graphs.

Instructional Approach and Methods

This section of this course is an asynchronous WEB class. That means that there are no set meeting times for instruction or assessment. This class is mostly self-paced, but there are due dates each week to help keep you on track to complete the class. You are welcome to work ahead. Your progress in this class should be as follows:

- With each new section, either download the PowerPoint presentation from eLEARN or go to MyLab Math for video content from the publisher. There is a companion lecture guide for each PPT file in eLEARN.
- 2. Complete the lecture guide with the help of the PowerPoint presentation or watch the video. Take notes while watching the video.
- 3. Complete the homework assignment in MyLab Math.
- 4. Take the first attempt for the quiz.
 - 1. If you are happy with your grade on the first attempt, you are not required to take the second attempt.
 - 2. You are strongly discouraged from starting the second attempt until after you have gone back over your notes and reviewed the kinds of questions that you were asked on the first attempt.
- 5. Prepare for the section tests by reviewing your notes and the homework assignments that will be covered in the section tests. You can always go back into the homework and review or work similar questions until you understand how to answer the question correctly the first time every time.
- 6. Complete your tests using HonorLock for your proctored unit tests and final exam.

Assessment, Evaluation and Testing Procedures

- Regular attendance and participation in the course are necessary for your success.
 The first day of attendance will be recorded as the day the student registers for MyLab Math. The last date of attendance will be recorded as the last day the student works in MyLab Math, if the student does not take the final exam.
- 2. Homework will be administered through the software package MyLab Math

- 3. Quizzes will be administered through the software package MyLab Math
- 4. Four, unit tests will be administered through the software package MyLab Math
- 5. There will be a mandatory comprehensive final exam. The final exam will be administered in MyLab Math. The final exam must be proctored through the online service HonorLock, or by appointment with me via Microsoft Teams or in-person. You will not be allowed to use your notes or the internet for your final exam. There are no extensions granted for the final exam.
