Student Learning Outcomes/Objectives

- Outcome 1: Identify the practices, professional guidelines, and relevant regulations for providing a safe, equitable, indoor and outdoor environment to support each child's individual needs.
- Outcome 2: Demonstrate knowledge of the principles for creating safety, health, and nutrition practices in the early childhood setting.
- Outcome 3: Identify appropriate resources in the community related to health, safety, and nutrition.
- Outcome 4: Identify, describe and compare strategies to create a developmentally appropriate and inclusive learning environment to foster children's physical and mental health, safety, and sense of security.

Instructional Approach and Methods

This is a hybrid course. This class will meet eight times on campus throughout the semester. On weeks the class does not meet on campus, online content and assignments will be provided. You will use the elearn course site for accessing course content, discussion boards and assignments. Class

meetings are used for assignment overviews, accessing print resources, and hands-on activities designed to assist you in applying the content presented in the course. Your instructor will provide a schedule of class meeting and due dates for all course work.

Assessment, Evaluation and Testing Procedures

Evaluations for this course will include discussion boards, quizzes, field trips, in class assignments, online projects, and mid term and final.

The midterm and final exams will be delivered online and are timed. Each exam will include multiple choice, true-false, and essay items. The exams will range from 40-60 items and you will only be allowed one attempt for each exam. There will be no after-the-fact, make-up examinations. If you miss one exam, the final exam score will count twice (once for the missed exam and once for your final exam score). Assignments and projects related to this course will be posted on the <http://elearn.ws.edu> web site. As a reminder, student logins for elearn.ws.edu are the same username and password students use to login to computers on campus.

Assignments

1. 50 points of your grade in this course will be based on the scheduled discussion board posting. To receive full points for each discussion, you are required to make frequent, intelligent contributions to the class discussions, while being respectful toward all members of the class and their views.

2. 40 points of your grade will be based on your attendance and active participation in each of the class meetings (8 total x five points) on campus.

3. 50 points of your grade in this course will be based on a Communicable Illness Newsletter. You will conduct research and create a family newsletter with helpful information about one communicable illness common among young children in group settings. You will include specific information about aspects of illnesses including prevention, identification, exclusion from school, and long-term issues. The newsletter will include sources of information and resources for families seeking additional

information or assistance, including an activity that families can do with children to learn about preventing the spread of the illness. This will be done using computer software and newsletters may be shared among classmates.

4. 100 points of your grade will be based on the creation of a Keeping Children Safe lesson plan and presentation.

5. 50 points of your grade will be based on the creation of a Meal Plan for toddlers or preschoolers in an early education setting. This will be completed in class.

6. 60 points of your grade will be based on a Playground Inspection and Evaluation Report.

7. 150 points of your grade in this course will be based on reading quizzes and mini assignments. To help you understand the concepts discussed in the textbook, you will be required to complete 15 quizzes. The first quiz will be a syllabus quiz. Each quiz or mini-assignment will be worth 10 points. Each assignment has a date limit. Once the limit date occurs, YOU CANNOT SUBMIT that particular assignment. They reflect college-level work. Always re-read and proof your work before turning it into the instructor.

8. 50 points of your grade will be based on the midterm assessment.

9. 50 points of your grade will be based on the final assessment.

Class Participation

Making frequent, intelligent contributions to the class discussions, while being respectful toward all members of the class and their views is the expected participation for the course. Each week, we will use technology such as e-learn, mobile apps, and web resources to augment our learning experience. Attendance is required when on campus classes are scheduled.

Assignments and Projects

Assignments and projects related to this course will be posted on the <http://elearn.ws.edu> web site. As a reminder, student logins for elearn.ws.edu are the same username and password students use to log into computers on campus.

Late Work Policy

Students are expected to turn in all assignments on or before the due date. In recognition that sometimes situations occur that are beyond your control and require you to have an extension on an assignment due date, there is a three-day period in which you may submit assignments past the due date. Each day over the due date increases the loss of points assigned. An assignment submitted within one day past the due date loses 5%, two days 10%, and three days 15%. Any assignment not received within three days of the due date receives 0 points. Technical issues are not valid excuses for late work unless the problem stems from WSCC servers, in which case the instructor will designate new due dates for any assignments affected.

Grading Turn-around

In general, assignments submitted on time will be graded within ten (10) work days of submission due dates. Students will be notified if there is a need to vary this schedule. Assignments submitted late will be graded by the end of the course.

Contacting the Instructor

Office hours for the instructor are listed in the Message from the instructor page of the Getting Started module. Calls are welcomed and voice mail will be responded to as soon as possible. Email through the course elearn is the preferred method of communication. Students can expect a response to email within 24-48 hours (throughout the week). They will be notified if this schedule cannot be kept.

Academic Honesty

Faculty expect all students to refrain from acts of academic misconduct including but not limited to:

1. Plagiarism - refers to using another person's ideas or writing without giving proper credit to the original source. 2. Cheating - construed as attempting to deceive or mislead which includes, but is not limited to the following:
- a. Utilizing old tests, projects, notes or written papers.
 - b. Providing unauthorized information to a fellow student about exam content.
 - c. Receiving unauthorized aid from any source with quizzes, examinations, or other assignments.
 - d. Seeking information in an unacceptable manner during/preceding an exam or other assigned work (cheat sheet, verbal exchange, looking at another person's paper or electronic device, utilizing headphones, using textbook when the test/quiz is not an open book test/quiz, using textbook test bank etc.).
 - e. Consulting with a classmate or others when taking a computerized test.
 - f. Disregarding other specific policies and procedures outlined for a particular class.
 - g. Utilizing unapproved technology/electronic equipment during testing (i.e.: mobile devices such as cell phones, smart devices, or tablets, etc.).
 - h. Using the same Internet Protocol network address (IP address) as another student for testing without approval from the course faculty.

The use of any generative artificial intelligence (AI) tool, such as OpenAI's ChatGPT, Google's Bard, or any other pre-trained language model (commonly referred to as "chatbot"), must be cited for any assignment where it has been used and may not be used unless specifically allowed by your instructor. COURSE GROUND RULES
